III. What can cause an extensive damage to national fabric?

To date happiness has defied definition. Most people tend to equate

happiness with fun, good living, plenty of money. If happiness were synonyms with all this, rich people with all their luxuries and countless parties, would be perpetually happy. But in actual fact, they are frequently, acutely unhappy, despite their riches and ability to indulge in fun activities at will. Fun is what we experience during as act; happiness is that intangible something we experience after an act. We may have fun watching a movie, going shopping, meeting friends-these are all fun activities that afford us fleeting moments of relaxation and enjoyment. Happiness, on the other hand, is a much stronger, deeper and more abiding emotion.

- 2. If we perceive happiness as the ultimate goal, we must also devise a way to reach that goal. The way to happiness is not a smooth, broad highway along which we can cruise at a comfortable speed.
